### Course Description:

Scope and methodology of economics as a social science, the measurement of national income, the theory of national income determination, money and banking, monetary and fiscal policy, and international economics. The course aims to provide an overview of the principles of macroeconomic analysis at the most fundamental levels.

### Course Objectives:

- Demonstrate a fundamental understanding of the workings of the macroeconomy;
- Employ the models learned to analyze daily macroeconomic phenomena and policies; and
- Develop independent thinking and problem-solving skills.

This is helpful in understanding current economic events both in the U.S. and abroad.

**Examinations:** The exams will test both the **recall** and your ability to **think** and **analyze**. Exams will be a combination of multiple-choice and true/false questions. A student who begins an exam late will not be given extra time. Prepare in advance for challenging circumstances such as having exams in other courses on the same day. Exams will be taken on Canvas using Respondus LockDown Browser and Monitor during the scheduled class time. This means that a webcam will be mandatory for this course. Students will only be allowed a blank sheet of paper and a pencil during the exam. The final exam is optional if you complete the three regular exams. Note: the final exam will be **comprehensive**.

**Online Homework Assignments:** Homework assignments and practice problems will be distributed on *MindTap*. Practice problems for each chapter are available on *MindTap*. You will not be able to work on an assignment once its open period has expired. **Late Policy:** Homework assignment will be accepted up

to 2 days after the due date, with an associated penalty of 10% of your total points. You are encouraged to get familiar with *MindTap* as early as possible by reviewing: **Getting Started on MindTap: Key Tools for Learning Success** on *MindTap*.

**Chapter Quizzes:** Quizzes will consist of multiple-choice and true-false questions, covering textbook material. Each quiz will have 20 questions. Quizzes will be distributed on *MindTap*. Review chapter material before completing an assigned quiz. Once you begin a quiz, you must complete it in one sitting. Quizzes will be open-book tests and serve as a practice for the main exams.

**Weekly Discussion Forum:** Each week, each student would be required to submit a response to a discussion question based on the weekly readings (answers should be at least 100 words). In addition, each person is to post at least two responses to other submissions (response is to be at least 25 words). You will get 3 points for each completed discussion contribution (including initial answer and 2 responses). You will be assigned to a discussion group. Your lowest score will be dropped.

**Attendance Policy:** Attendance will be taken and will make up 5% of your final grade. There will be two (Tuesday & Thursday) live lectures each week, and you are expected to attend all class meetings to earn attendance points. You will earn one point for each class attended. Three absences will be excused. **Note:** You are expected to review class materials before live lectures.

**Participation:** These points consist of live lecture Poll Everywhere questions, academic integrity quiz, exam surveys, and will make up 3% of your final grade. Your three (3) lowest scores will be dropped.
