

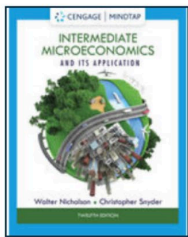
**ECON3122 – 002**  
**Intermediate Microeconomics**  
**Spring 2021**

**Instructor:** Krista Saral  
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**Course Description:** Microeconomic analysis with emphasis on consumer and producer theory. More specifically, the course will focus on preferences, utility maximization/optimal consumption, optimal production and pricing strategies.

**Course Objectives:** The objective of this course is to provide rigorous treatment of a modern microeconomic theory.

**Course Content and Textbook:** All course content – slides and video lectures, as well as the e-book learning system, MindTap, will be accessed through the course webpage on Canvas. I will lean heavily on the MindTap system, so make sure that you have your subscription ordered as graded homework will be delivered through this system. **Grading:** There will be two midterms and one cumulative final exam. Additionally, there will be 10 graded homework on a regular basis (mostly weekly, except during exam weeks – see tentative schedule below). The average of homework grades will be taken at the end of the semester, with the lowest two scores dropped. Since the two lowest grades are dropped, there are no “redos” for homework. Grades will be curved based on the performance of the class, and I do not offer extra credit. The breakdown of assignment/exam weights in grading is as follows:

Homework:	20%
Midterm Exam 1:	25%
Midterm Exam 2:	25%
Final Exam:	30%

As an example, suppose that a student has a homework average (top 8 scores) of 85, a midterm 1 score of 75, a midterm 2 score of 95, and a final exam score of 88. This student’s score would be calculated as:  
Final grade =  $85(.2) + 75(.25) + 95(.25) + 88(.30) = 85.9$
